"Trade Winds" Spanish is quite informal; it drops "s" sounds which allow people to talk at a faster pace.

**How does Argentinian Spanish differ from other dialects of Spanish? Where is the origination and what makes it different?**

It has some out-of-date grammar, and the vocabulary and pronunciation are heavily influenced from the Italians. Instead of "tú", "vos" is used instead. Also, they pronounce "ll" as "zh" instead of "y" in English speaking.

**What is Castilian Spanish and how is it different other dialects of Spanish?**

This type of Spanish is used in Madrid and northern Spain and was based on characteristics that never reached the New World. In Castilian Spanish "ci" and "ce" are pronounced as "th". In Madrid, "gracias" sounds like "gratheas".
